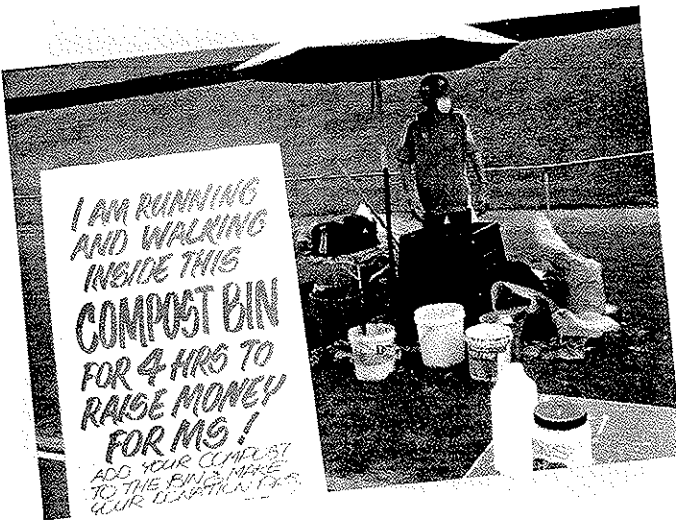

PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2009

I have pleasure in reporting to members of the Society on the activities and efforts of the committee on your behalf during 2009.

The year started in the midst of the most serious recession the country has seen since the 1930s. The committee was fully aware that the Society had incurred a loss of over \$200,000 the previous year and knew it had to take some tough decisions to protect the ongoing financial position of the society.

We were lucky that we had built up some substantial cash reserves in the years to the end of 2007. The committee took the view that these reserves had in part been accumulated for exactly the period of uncertainty and recession we were in. We approved a budget with an approved loss of \$100,000 in the full knowledge that we were going to do everything possible to do substantially better than that. However we knew that to even achieve a budgeted loss of that size we would have to take some very difficult decisions.

The committee was unanimous that as far as possible essential services for people with MS had to be maintained. This we were able to achieve, although we were forced to cut out some services such as free taxis. We also asked the staff to cut their hours by 10% and they responded very positively. This enabled the Society to meet its obligations for providing essential services to those members most in need. On your behalf I record our appreciation for the commitment and efforts of all of our staff during a particularly difficult year

As you will hear from the Treasurer later in the meeting we achieved our objective and our loss for the year was \$104,000 inclusive of non cash expenses of \$39,000.

At a national government level the environment in which the Society operates has changed significantly. To date there has been little impact on us but I am certain this is about to change in the near future. Our Ministry of Health contract will transfer to the new National Health Board. There is strong pressure on the three DHBs in the area we operate in to work much more closely together. This is yet to happen but we will welcome a much more uniform level of service for all of our members. At this stage the service our members receive for healthcare does to some extent depend on where they live.

There is considerable effort going into strengthening primary care offered through general practice. The DHBs and Primary Health Organisations are working together to develop Integrated Family Health Centres which will in time see some services such as some outpatient services offered in community rather than through hospitals as at present. There is an intention to involve organisations such as ourselves in these developments.

Your committee is keeping a close eye on all of these developments with the view of ensuring we can continue to offer an improved service to you our members.

Nationally MSSNZ had a difficult year with the newly appointed National Director resigning after a major cost over run on a computer software and hardware purchase. At the AGM in October there was considerable discussion on the future shape of MS organisations in New Zealand and on the relationship of regional societies such as ours and the national organisation. Since then the national board has issued a discussion paper on the reorganisation of the relationship. Your committee has responded expressing support for an informed debate on the future to be concluded before the next AGM in October 2010.

For the future I am very keen to consolidate the finances of this society so that it is the strongest position possible to withstand any of the challenges the future can hold. To do that, we need to look at the opportunities that exist with in our current membership and networks to maximise the opportunities for fund raising and supporting each other. With this in mind I have asked our General Manager to identify ways that members of the committee can support our staff and improve contact between the many activities of the members of the society and the Committee.

We have made a conscious decision to hold fewer fund raising activities this year but spend more time planning them to ensure that we maximise the funding from those events we do have. We are about to embark on a campaign for regular giving via payroll. I urge those of you who are able, to think whether you can assist us in that way.

Later in the year we intend to put a concentrated effort into a campaign for bequests. Once again if you are thinking of revising your will in the near future please keep us in mind. The sound financial position of the Society today and its ability to offer the services it does now is in part due to the generous bequests we have received over the years from people who have gone before us.

We hope we can use the newsletter as a contact point for members or their networks to advertise services they offer so other members can support them.

In conclusion I wish to acknowledge the efforts dedication and commitment of our staff ably led by Gary McMahon during a year of real challenge.

My thanks also to Graham Wear and the rest of the committee for their support and interest in everything the Society does. In particular I want to mention Jo Smith who is retiring from the Committee after serving on it for more than 13 years. Jo has been an inspiration to all of the committee and many of our members as well for many years. Organisations like ours depend on the Jo Smith's of this world and we have been extremely fortunate that Jo has seen fit to contribute to our society for so many years.

Those of us who have worked alongside Michael and value his friendship will miss his cheerful presence.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT 2009



This last year has been busy and full of challenges for the society and I'm pleased to report on our progress. At the time of writing we are into our third year as a 'merged' society and I'm happy to report that we have managed to maintain an overall 'business as usual' approach to most of the activities of the larger society. Equally significant, there have been no staff changes at all over the last twelve months, which reflects both the loyalty and commitment of the staff team, but also indicates that the society is a good employer.

From the very outset of our merger the intention of the Committee was that we would maintain core services to clients as a priority. We have managed to achieve that goal over the last year despite the restrictions placed upon us by the financial downturn.

As is the usual practice, I will highlight some of the activities and achievements over the last year.

CLIENT SERVICES

- Our team of Field Workers undertook more than 1450 home visits between them. Providing a personalised service to a diverse range of clients with a very diverse range of needs is a challenging task. Our highly experienced team undertakes the task with skill and professionalism and I record my thanks to them for their consistency, energy and willingness to go the extra mile.
- One of our key client events during the year was the 3rd Retreat held once again at the Mana Retreat Centre on the Coromandel. Numbers were slightly down this year at 26 people, but the quality of the event and the outcome for those that attended was excellent.
- DREAMS – our social programme was suspended at the beginning of the year as part of our cost-cutting exercise and that suspension continues into 2010. Our staff, particularly the Field Workers, have worked diligently to enable people to connect and meet each other wherever possible despite this frustrating impediment.
- Volunteers continued to be an important resource for the society. We pride ourselves on the quality and quantity of those that step up to help us in a wide variety of ways. During the year 45 new volunteers joined us in roles from helping at events, at pool groups and in the office, to collecting on the streets during our Appeal Week and visiting clients in their homes.
- In the early part of the year we were fortunate to have Prof. David Bates speak to our members. David is Professor of Clinical Neurology at the University of Newcastle upon Tyne and Editor of the International MS Journal. He highlighted the history of MS through to the numerous worldwide research work currently being undertaken.
- One of the highlights of the year happened at the end of August when Prof. George Jelinek spoke to an audience of over 240 people at a special presentation in Auckland. The event was recorded by us to create a DVD and was also webcast live. This powerful delivery is a great resource for the society. Free copies were provided to the other regional societies around the country. We also have an ongoing programme to give copies of the DVD free of charge to people that are newly diagnosed in Auckland.
- The Jelinek presentation was also recorded at the same time by a film crew for the Open Door documentary series and this programme was aired in February 2010 on TV3. The programme presented an insight into the lives of people with MS and their hopes, dreams and aspirations. We have permission to screen the documentary at our AGM.

FUNDRAISING AND INCOME

- In April we were delighted to be able to host a fundraising Dinner with after dinner entertainment provided by Greg Murphy and Roger Farrelly from the Rock FM.
- Peta Mathias's 60th Birthday – in November we undertook one of our most ambitious projects yet. Peta Mathias turned 60 and we ran a highly successful event for her at the Auckland Museum. The event was a major fundraiser for us and featured a whole host of cabaret acts. Our thanks go to everyone that willingly gave their time and energy to pull off such a great event and special thanks to Nicola Garland for producing the event with spectacular results.

- ART for MS our annual fundraiser which is also a showcase of the creative skills of people with MS was held in October in the foyer of the Rendezvous hotel.
- Awareness Week – the highlight of our activity was our street collection which in 2009 raised in excess of \$35,000. We were delighted with the result but somewhat frustrated that, due to a lack of volunteers, we couldn't fill all of the available sites that we had across Auckland.
- Footloose Funwalk – this annual outdoor event was always seen as a longer-term project and the goal was that we would build up numbers of participants year on year. That hasn't happened over the last few years. We are tackling this with renewed energy, a dynamic sub-committee and some new ideas for 2010.
- Charitable Trusts – continue to be a major source of income and we managed to increase revenue from this stream during 2009. Having said that we acknowledge that consolidation in this area will reduce the number of Trusts that we are able to apply to for funding each year.

SPECIAL RELATIONSHIPS

- **Dr Ernie Willoughby** is a long term supporter of our work and on behalf of our Committee, staff and membership I'd like to thank him for his dedication, guidance and assistance over the last twelve months.
- **Marvyn and Doug Smith** are long term supporters of the work of the society. In 2005 they established a Trust with the society as a beneficiary and we continue to be supported financially by them. Our grateful thanks go to them for their continued support.
- **Fidelity Life Assurance Company Ltd** have a long association with the Society and continue to support us in a variety of different ways, all of which are valued by us. My thanks go to them for their loyalty and consistency.
- **Rod Milner Motors** have a long relationship with the society and we acknowledge their support and thank them.
- **Justine Simmonds and Fiona Matherson.** We are very fortunate in the Auckland area to have two excellent MS Nurse Specialists. The society recognises the benefit to people with MS of our Field team working closely alongside the Nurses to ensure that we don't duplicate effort and waste precious resources. I'd like to thank both Justine and Fiona for their professionalism and diligence in this regard.

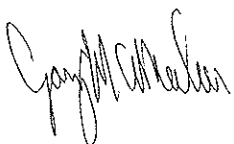
2010 & BEYOND

I would like to pay tribute to my colleagues, Anju, Allison, Bea, Diane, Dianne, Glen, Georga, Jake, Nicola and Tina. Some 26 months post-merger we are now truly one team and each person has played a part in melding us together with their dedication, enthusiasm, skills and professionalism.

And lastly, my thanks to our President Neil Woodhams for his continued support, to our wonderful Committee, our many volunteers and to our Patron, Dr Ernie Willoughby.

AUDIT REPORT

TO THE MEMBERS OF MULTIPLE SCLEROSIS SOCIETY OF AUCKLAND AND THE NORTH SHORE INCORPORATED

We have audited the financial statements on pages 8 to 11. The financial statements provide information about the past financial performance and the financial position of the Society as at 31 December 2009. This information is stated in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 10.

Committee's Responsibilities

The committee of the Society is responsible for the preparation of financial statements which comply with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand, and fairly reflect the financial position of the Society as at 31 December 2009 and the results of operations for the year ended on that date.

Auditors' Responsibilities

It is our responsibility to express an independent opinion on the financial statements presented by the Society and report our opinion to you.

Basis of Opinion

An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes assessing: –

- The significant estimates and judgments made by the committee in the preparation of the financial statements; and
- Whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Society's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards in New Zealand. We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary. We obtained sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatements, whether caused by fraud or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

At the request of the Society's General Manager we have formatted the final financial statements from a trial balance and other information provided to us by the client's independent accounting advisor. Other than this and in our capacity as auditors we have no other relationship with, or interests in, the Society.

Qualified Opinion

In common with other organisations of a similar nature, control over the receipt of monies from donations, prior to being recorded is limited. The Society appears to be taking reasonable steps to ensure controls in this area are adequate; however there are no practical economic audit procedures to determine the effectiveness of these controls. The Society's income from donations and Fundraising events was \$192,211 (2008: \$126,306).

In this respect alone we have not obtained all the information and explanations that we have required.

In our opinion, except for adjustments that might have been found necessary had we been able to obtain sufficient evidence concerning the above mentioned limitation the financial report on page 8 fairly reflects the results of operations for the year ended 31 December 2009.

In our opinion the financial report on page 9 fairly reflects the financial position of the Society as at 31 December 2009.

Our audit was completed on 12th March 2010 and our qualified opinion is expressed as at that date.

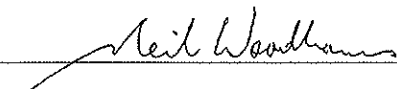

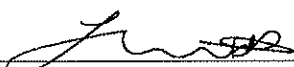

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

As at 31 December 2009

Reporting Entity

Multiple Sclerosis Society of Auckland And The North Shore Incorporated is an Incorporated Society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908. The financial statements of the society have been prepared according to generally accepted accounting practice.

Measurement Base

The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of financial performance and financial position on a historical cost basis are followed by the society.

Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of the financial performance and financial position, have been applied:

Property, Plant & Equipment

All owned items of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost and depreciated as outlined below. Initial cost includes the purchase consideration, and those costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition.

Subsequent expenditure relating an item of property, plant or equipment is added to its gross carrying amount when such expenditure either increases the future economic benefits beyond its existing service potential, or is necessarily incurred to enable future economic benefits to be obtained.

Items of property, plant and equipment are written down immediately if an impairment in the value of the asset causes its recoverable amount to fall below its carrying amount. The impairment is recognised in the statement of financial performance.

Where an item of property, plant and equipment is disposed of, the gain or loss recognised in the statement of financial performance is calculated as the difference between the net sale price and the carrying amount of the asset.

Depreciation

The Committee has reassessed rates of depreciation based on the useful life of assets and has charged depreciation accordingly as under:

Buildings	4.0% DV
Office furniture & equipment	10.0% to 48.0% DV
Motor vehicles	26.0% DV
Aid equipment	9.5% to 26.4% DV

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at expected realised values.

Goods & Services Taxation

These financial statements have been prepared on a GST exclusive basis with the exception of accounts receivable or payable which are shown in the Statement of Financial Position on a GST inclusive basis.

Income Tax

No provision has been made for income tax as the Society is a non profit organisation and is exempt from income tax

Grants

All grants exempt those received for projects are recognised in operating revenue. In these cases, the grant is treated as a current liability until the project is complete.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. All policies have been applied on a basis consistent with those used in the prior year.

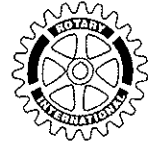
